Room 5

Room 5 have been learning about migration and how the first people came to Aotearoa. We learnt that they were expert sailors who used the stars, the waves, the clouds and birds to guide them in their waka. We have also been learning about the new tools they needed in Aotearoa . They made fish hooks out of wood and bone and used rocks for knives. They made rope from flax and also made adzes out of greenstone. It was fun learning about the tools.



Room 11

This term has been loads of fun for Room 11!
We have been learning about our identity and what makes us unique. We have worked together as a class to create our Mana
Potential/MANAWA tree by including how each value is represented to us. Writing and reading have been interesting as we have been learning to incorporate adjectives and adverbs into our recount writing!

We have been learning all about our Turangawaewae, who we are as individuals, what makes us unique and what our place is in this world.
